

Introduction: A Daily Delighting in the Lord's Word

It came as a surprise to me that the Bible never once talks about the Christian reading the Bible. We are never commanded, encouraged, or instructed to read the Scriptures. Instead, the Scriptures command us to "hear" God's Word, "meditate" on God's Word, and "delight" in God's Word.

The book of Psalms begins with this this promise:

Blessed is the man that walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stands in the way of sinners, or sits in the seat of the scornful.

But his delight is in the law of the LORD; and in his law does he meditate day and night.

And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that brings forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper. (Psalm 1:1-3)

Verse two gives us the purpose of this Devotional Challenge Book. We want to train ourselves to delight in the Lord's word, and meditate on it night and day. We want to hear the Lord's Word, rejoice in the Lord's Word, delight in the Lord's Word, believe, pray, and use the Lord's Word fruitfully. We know that His Words are the "words of eternal life" (John 6:68), and that "faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ" (Romans 10:17). The Lord's Word is our treasure (Psalm 19:10), our joy (Psalm 119:111), our light and salvation (Psalm 119:105). It gives us wisdom (Psalm 119:98) and peace (Psalm 119:165) and all the treasures of heaven.

The Lord's Word also informs our prayers. When we pray we are not pulling words out of the corrupt depths of our own heart (Mark 7:20), but taking up the Sword of the Spirit to wield against the devil and the world in our prayers (Ephesians 6:17-18). Our prayers are rich and strong when they well up out of the Lord's Word, hidden in our heart.

When we pray we are beginning to keep the Second Commandment, and use the Lord's name in a good and fruitful way. When we meditate and rejoice in the Lord's Word we are beginning to keep the Third Commandment and make holy our days and ourselves. Our sinful flesh does not know how to believe in God, and so it does not know how to pray or meditate on the Scriptures. These things are taught to us by the Lord Himself. The disciples asked Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray," (Luke 11:1), and we ask the same thing, that the Lord would make us His students, that He would open our ears to hear His Word, and open our lips to "make our requests known to Him" (Philippians 4:6).

About this Workbook

This text is designed as a workbook to be used for 16 weeks. At the end of this workbook the reader should be equipped to sustain the daily work and joy of hearing God's Word and prayer.

Each week introduces a new Devotional Challenge.

The daily worksheets which follow instruct the Christian in that particular challenge. When you begin you will only need this workbook, but as you progress you will begin using your own Bible, hymnal, and

other resources. We will warn you ahead of time when you will need to have supplemental texts, but here is a list for those of you who like to plan ahead.

Week 10: Bible

Week 16: Notebook or Journal

The plan of this Devotional Challenge Workbook is such that you are working your way out of the workbook and into the Bible and other devotional texts. The workbook is training you away from this workbook.

In the first few weeks you will only need a couple of minutes for each day's challenge. As the challenges are added each week there will be more time required, reaching a maximum of 15 or 20 minutes on week 8. This time is long enough to spend some time with the Scriptures and in prayers, but brief enough to not be burdensome. Of course, any time we open the Scriptures we could spend hours considering and praying the words. This workbook is not intended to be a burden, but rather bring the blessing of the Lord's Word into our ears and hearts.

This Devotional Challenge Book is designed to be used individually, but it can also be used as a family or with a group. It is offered to the church with the prayer that it will be helpful for the Gospel, that the Word of Christ would dwell in us richly (Colossians 3:16) and bear the fruit of life and salvation.

Week 1 Challenge: A Time for Prayer

We are all busy, and the devil loves it. We run around this way and that doing all sorts of stuff: working, playing, talking, doing, fixing, moving. Some things are good, some are useless, some are bad, but the devil uses this busyness to push out time for hearing the Lord's Word and prayer.

Our schedule, though, can be used as a tool against the devil. We can schedule time for prayer.

With all of the various duties and obligations, it is almost impossible to give appropriate attention to hearing the Lord's Word and to prayer unless we plan to do so. So, this week's challenge is:

SCHEDULE A TIME FOR PRAYER

For the prayers this week you will only need 2-3 minutes. (As we add more challenges you will need a bit more time, perhaps 10-15 minutes, but we are starting very slow.) Pick a time and a place where you will pray each day on the top of the next page. Then, after you pray each day, mark the time and place that you actually prayed.

We are working toward matching up our plans with our prayers, but don't feel bad if you don't get it done. If, for example, you planned to pray every morning at 5:00 am in your bedroom, but never woke up until 8:00 am every morning, don't skip your prayers. Write in your log that you prayed at night before bed. And, next week, try to schedule a different time for prayer that works with your schedule.

It is helpful to pick a time on the edges of our activity. The history of the church has proven that first thing in the morning or the last thing in the evening are some of the best times for our individual prayers and devotions, like meal-times are the best times for family devotions.

The prayers this week and next are so short that you could pray anywhere, but we will soon need a time and place for reading and reflection, so pick a place and time that you think will mostly be uninterrupted. Also, we want to begin to pray out loud, so it is good to have a private location.

We introduce, this week, the five basic prayers of Evangelical Piety: The Invocation, The Creed, The Lord's Prayer, and the Morning or Evening Prayer. It is always appropriate to offer other prayers for ourselves and others.

Week 2 Challenge: The Ten Commandments

Next to the Creed and the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments are the most important words for our Christian living and praying. Most people think of the Ten Commandments as God's set of do's and don'ts, but they are much more.

First, the Ten Commandments are given to protect the Lord's gifts to us. For example, in the First Commandment, "You shall have no other gods," the Lord is giving us the gift of Himself as our God. In the Second Commandment we are given the gift of prayer, in the Third Commandment we are given the gift of God's Word, of His teaching, and of the church. The Fourth Commandment protects the gift of family, authority, and an ordered world. The Fifth Commandment protects life, the Sixth protects marriage, and the Seventh protects private property. The Eighth Commandment protects our name and our neighbor's name and reputation, and the Ninth and Ten Commandments protect our contentment and our hearts for all kinds of false desires. When we meditate on the Ten Commandments we are meditating on the gifts of God for our life in this world.

Second, the Ten Commandments give shape to our Christian love for our neighbor. Every day we are living in this world, acting, doing, talking and listening, and what we should do and say is not always obvious. So we fall back on this fundamental question for our lives and our prayers, "What is my station in life according to the Ten Commandments?" The Ten Commandments give shape to our Christian love for our neighbor.

Third, the Holy Spirit uses the Ten Commandments to calibrate our conscience. The devil is always working to confuse, disorient, and harden our conscience. He wants us to call "good" "evil" and "evil" "good". The devil wants us to think that our good works are sin, and that our sin is not that bad. He enlists the world and our sinful flesh to confuse our conscience. Meditating on the Ten Commandments helps keep our conscience tender and working properly.



If you say your prayers in the morning, repeat the Ten Commandments *after* your prayers. If you say your prayers in the evening, say the Ten Commandments *before* your prayers. Say them word for word, out loud. You will soon have them memorized and learned by heart, and you will be carrying them with you everywhere you go.

You will also schedule your prayers this week. If last week's plan didn't work out, try a different time.

Week 3 Challenge: Hearing God's Word

God's Word is our great treasure in life. King David reminds us of this in the last half of Psalm 19:

The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul; the testimony of the Lord is sure, making wise the simple; the precepts of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart; the commandment of the Lord is pure, enlightening the eyes; the fear of the Lord is clean, enduring forever; the rules of the Lord are true, and righteous altogether. More to be desired are they than gold, even much fine gold; sweeter also than honey and drippings of the honeycomb. (Psalm 19:7-10)

This week we add the Scriptures to our devotions, and give attention to hearing the Lord's Word. Our prayers are our words to God. The Scriptures is God's word to us. When we read the Scriptures we are hearing the voice of our Lord and God, our Creator and Redeemer. His voice gives us life and hope, forgiveness and salvation. We, then, want to spend our lives hearing and rejoicing in His Word.

This week's challenge is:

GIVING ATTENTION TO THE LORD'S WORD

A small section of Scripture is included for each day of the week. Read the text out loud at a moderate pace. Read with a pencil (or pen). Underline important sentences. Circle important words. Put a question mark next to things that you don't understand. There is margin around the text for notes, insights and questions.

The passages these next few weeks are intentionally short. Take your time. Stop and think about what you are reading. Ask questions of the text. "Who is talking? Who are they talking to? What is happening? What am I learning? What is important to remember? What is the surprise in this passage?"

You might want to read out of your Bible. Try reading the passages from the following pages for a few weeks. It is easier to mark up a workbook than you Bible. There is reading and there is *attentive* reading. We want to give our attention to these holy words.

We still want to schedule a time for prayer, finding a time that works best for us. We are also (and for the rest of our lives) praying the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments.

Week 4 Challenge: Looking for Law and Gospel

God speaks to us in two different words: the word of the Law and the word of the Gospel. The Law is God's word of instruction, it tells us what to do and how to live. The Law always demands, and the promises of reward for keeping the Law are always conditional. The Law is summarized and put forth completely in the Ten Commandments. Because we are sinner the Law always accuses us. Like a mirror it shows us our sin and our great need for a Savior.

The Gospel, on the other hand, is the free and gracious promise of the forgiveness of sins through the death of Jesus on the cross. While the Law commands and threatens, the Gospel promises and forgives. The Gospel is unconditional, a free gift from God not based on our actions, works, or even on who we are, but is God's gracious work and attitude towards us.

Both the Law and the Gospel are God's Word, and the Bible contains both. (In fact, both the Old and New Testaments contain both Law and Gospel.) The Law and the Gospel are given for different purposes. The Law instructs us and convicts us of sin. The Gospel forgives us and comforts us before God.

When hearing the Scriptures, it is supremely important to distinguish between the Law and the Gospel. The Lutheran fathers said this about the distinction between Law and Gospel:

As the distinction between the Law and the Gospel is a special brilliant light, which serves to the end that God's Word may be rightly divided, and the Scriptures of the holy prophets and apostles may be properly explained and understood, we must guard it with especial care, in order that these two doctrines may not be mingled with one another, or a law be made out of the Gospel, whereby the merit of Christ is obscured and troubled consciences are robbed of their comfort, which they otherwise have in the holy Gospel when it is preached genuinely and in its purity, and by which they can support themselves in their most grievous trials against the terrors of the Law. (Formula of Concord, Solid Declaration V.1)

This week's challenge is:

LOOK FOR LAW AND GOSPEL

Ask yourself, as you are reading, "Is this a command or a promise? Does this accuse or forgive? Is this about what I am to do or about what God has done for me?" Put and "L" next to the text that is Law, and a "G" or a "†" next to the passages of Gospel.

Readings this week are from St. Paul's epistles, where the distinction between the Law and the Gospel is most clearly seen. Continue to focus on attentive reading, underlining and marking the text, and reading and praying everything out loud.

Also focus on memorizing the words to the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. In the weeks to come we will stop printing these prayers and ask you to pray them from memory.

Week 5 Challenge: Meditating on the Text

The Bible never talks about "reading" the Bible. It does talk about "meditating" on God's Word. To meditation to think about, ponder, talk about, and give our minds and imagination over to a thing. Psalm 1 promises, "Blessed is the man ... [whose] delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night."

We mostly hear about meditation in connection with the eastern religions, where the goal is to empty our minds. Christian meditation is the opposite of this: we want to fill our minds and hearts with God's Word.

A traditional picture of meditation is the cow chewing the cud. The cow takes a bite of grass, chews on it for a while, swallows it, spits it back up, chews some more, swallows again, spits up again, chews some more, and so forth. Meditating on the Scripture is something like this. We say the words, hear the words, think on the words, imagine the words, talk about the words, read the words again, pray the words, and so forth.

We see examples of meditation with people who love a sports team. They are always thinking, reading, learning, talking about that team. We are meditating on a song when it gets stuck in our head. We want to be this way with God's Word, getting it stuck in our head, getting excited about the things we hear there. We want to delight in the Lord's Word, and meditation on God's Word is the way to get there.

We normally read to understand the text. This is of first importance, but when we meditate on the text we are also paying attention to our imagination and desires. The Holy Spirit is using the text to teach us, convict us, and comfort us.

It is helpful, when meditating on the text, to engage our imagination. We want, in this way, to "enter" the text. What are the sounds, the colors, the smells of the text? What to the different people want? How do the people feel? What is driving them to do what they do?

We also want the text to enter into our hearts. So we ask questions like, "What is God saying in these words? How do these words instruct me? Convict me? Comfort me?"

We often picture meditation as a solitary and silent practice, but Christian meditation is noisy! We are talking about the Lord's Word with our family and neighbors. "talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise" (Deuteronomy 6:7).

Week 6 Challenge: How to Read the Psalms

The Psalms are the prayer book of the Bible, and the foundation of our devotional life. For centuries the Lord's People have treasured the Psalms, and found in them help and consolation. The Psalms embrace all the contours of our human life, the joys and troubles, the fears and hopes, and they take our feet and plant them firmly in front of the face of God.

The Psalms assume that we are Christian, that we believe in God and hope in Him. The Psalms assume that we have trouble in this life, even that we have enemies. The Psalms assume that we need help, and that God is our helper.

The Psalms are poetry. They are written to be read, heard, and prayed again and again. Reading poetry is different from reading prose. A different approach is needed. There are two most important questions that we want to ask when reading the Psalms to help us get into the text.

The first question is: "Who is talking to whom?"

Is the Psalm a Christian talking to God (individual prayer)? Is it the congregation talking to God (corporate prayer)? Is it a preacher talking to the church or to the world (sermon)? Is it a troubled person talking to their enemies? It could be that the Psalm is God talking to us.

Note, please, that this can change throughout the Psalm. One verse might be a prayer, and the next verse a sermon! In one moment the Psalmist could be rebuking the enemies of God, and in the next verse his is praying to God for help and deliverance.

The second question is, "What is the image?"

The Psalms speak in pictures, and seeing and meditating on the pictures gets us into import and importance of the Psalms. "The Lord is my shepherd" brings all the imagery of the sheep resting in the shadow of their shepherd. I am that sheep. "God is our refuge and strength" has me on the ramparts of a strong castle wall, looking without fear over the armies that vainly march against me. "...he is like a tree planted by streams of water" has the coolness of a garden and the strength of the tree all bound up together, and this is contrasted to the dry and dust "chaff which the wind drives away. The images capture our imagination.

Often the Psalms will mix the pictures. Psalm 23, for example, begins with the image of the shepherd and his sheep to the image of a king at the banqueting table. When we identify the images we then listen to see how they interact with each other.

When we've identified who is talking to whom and what the images are, we can also look at the structure, the historical context, the use in the church, etc. But these questions come later. This week's challenge is to

Week 7 Challenge: Pray the Psalms

We will spend another week working on the Psalms, and particularly focus this week on praying the Psalms. Many of the Psalms are already prayers, and we see in them the cry of the Christian's heart to God our only help in time of need. Other Psalms are teaching and instruction which informs our prayers.

When we read the Scriptures and pray we have an audience with God. He is speaking to us, and we are speaking to Him. He is in the room with us, or better, we are standing before His throne, listening to His decrees and giving Him our petitions.

It is often difficult, as we are reading our Bible and praying, to remember that we stand before God's throne of grace. This week's challenge, then, is

PRAYING THE PSALMS

We will stop, as we read and meditate on the Psalms, to pray. If the Psalm is already a petition, we will take it up as our own prayer for ourselves and our neighbors. If the Psalm is instruction, we will craft it into a prayer. We will work through Psalm 27 a verse at a time, practicing as we go. Read the verse, paying attention to the words. Ask who is speaking to whom. Look for the images. Consider how this verse is a prayer for you and your neighbors.

This will seem clumsy at first, but the more we practice it the more comfortable we become with turning the Lord's Word into our own prayers.

Here is an example of how it will work this week.

Psalm 4

Answer me when I call, O God of my righteousness! You have given me relief when I was in distress. Be gracious to me and hear my prayer!

Week 8 Challenge: Scripture and Psalms, Putting it Together

Both the Psalms and the other books of the Bible are important part of our devotional life. The reading the Psalms together with the rest of the Scriptures fills out our devotional life. We will work, this week, to combine all the things we've learned so far, reading both a Psalm and a portion of Scripture each day.

This week's challenge:

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER: READING THE PSALMS AND OTHER SCRIPTURES

You will, this week, need more time to complete your devotional challenge. If you do not have time to complete all the readings, do what you can with the time you've appointed. Each day's challenge should take about 15 minutes. Of course you could spend much more time with these readings and prayers. It is important to not become discouraged, and doing a little each day is better than doing nothing at all. Remember, we are working to build devotional habits that will endure for a lifetime. We are committing to spend teach every day of our life hearing God's Word and asking Him for the help we need.

If you are consistently running out of time, try reading only the first paragraph of the Scripture passage. You might also consider reading both in the morning and the evening, using the Scripture meditation to begin your day, and meditating on the Psalm before going to sleep.

We also begin, this week, on a reading plan for the Scriptures. We will read a chapter of the Gospel of Matthew each day, finishing in 28 days. In the last challenge of this book we will consider different reading plans and approaches as you are preparing to launch out on your own.

Each passage is followed by a few questions to help you focus on attentive reading, looking for Law and Gospel, and meditating on the text. Next week you will begin reading the Scriptures out of your own Bible.

The Psalms are specially selected this week and next. On week 10 we will begin to read through the Psalms in order.

Each Psalm is followed with a number leading questions to help you keep paying attention to the words, identifying who is speaking to whom, and seeing the pictures. One verse of the Psalm is bolded to turn into a prayer.

17 So all the generations from Abraham to David were fourteen generations, and from David to the deportation to Babylon fourteen generations, and from the deportation to Babylon to the Christ fourteen generations.

The Birth of Jesus Christ

18 Now the birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. 19 And her husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. 20 But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. 21 She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." 22 All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: 23 "Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel" (which means, God with us). 24 When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, 25 but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. 

The Flight to Egypt

Herod Kills the Children

16 Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, became furious, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had ascertained from the wise men. 17 Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah:

'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight."

4 Now John wore a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. 5 Then Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan were going out to him, 6 and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

and

- "The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—16 the people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, and for those dwelling in the region and shadow of death, on them a light has dawned."

17 From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

Jesus Calls the First Disciples

18 While walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon (who is called Peter) and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea, for they were fishermen. 19 And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." 1 20 Immediately they left their nets and followed him. 21 And going on from there he saw two other brothers, James the son of Zebedee and John his brother, in the boat with Zebedee their father, mending their nets, and he called them. 22 Immediately they left the boat and their father and followed him.

Jesus Ministers to Great Crowds

23 And he went throughout all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction among the people. 24 So his fame spread throughout all Syria, and they brought him all the sick, those afflicted with various diseases and pains, those oppressed by demons, epileptics, and paralytics, and he healed them. 25 And great crowds followed him from Galilee and the Decapolis, and from Jerusalem and Judea, and from beyond the Jordan.

The Sermon on the Mount

1 Seeing the crowds, he went up on the mountain, and when he sat down, his disciples came to him.

The Beatitudes

- 2 And he opened his mouth and taught them, saying:
- 3 "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- 4 "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted.
- 5 "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.
- 6 "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.
- 7 "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy.
- 8 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.
- 9 "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God.
- 10 "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- 11 "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. 12 Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

Salt and Light

- 13 "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet.
- 14 "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. 15 Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. 16 In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

Christ Came to Fulfill the Law

17 "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them. 18 For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished. 19 Therefore whoever relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. 20 For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

Anger

21 "You have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not murder; and whoever murders will be liable to judgment.' 22 But I say to you that everyone who is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; whoever insults his brother will be liable to the council; and whoever says, 'You fool!' will be

liable to the hell of fire. 23 So if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, 24 leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift. 25 Come to terms quickly with your accuser while you are going with him to court, lest your accuser hand you over to the judge, and the judge to the guard, and you be put in prison. 26 Truly, I say to you, you will never get out until you have paid the last penny.

Lust

27 "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall not commit adultery.' 28 But I say to you that everyone who looks at a woman with lustful intent has already committed adultery with her in his heart. 29 If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. For it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body be thrown into hell. 30 And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. For it is better that you lose one of your members than that your whole body go into hell.

Divorce

31 "It was also said, 'Whoever divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce.' 32 But I say to you that everyone who divorces his wife, except on the ground of sexual immorality, makes her commit adultery, and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery.

Oaths

33 "Again you have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.' 34 But I say to you, Do not take an oath at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, 35 or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. 36 And do not take an oath by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. 37 Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil.

Retaliation

38 "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' 39 But I say to you, Do not resist the one who is evil. But if anyone slaps you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also. 40 And if anyone would sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. 41 And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles. 42 Give to the one who begs from you, and do not refuse the one who would borrow from you.

Love Your Enemies

43 "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' 44 But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, 45 so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. For he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. 46 For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? 47 And if you greet only your brothers, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? 48 You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

- Give us this day our daily bread,
- and forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors.
- 13 And lead us not into temptation,

but deliver us from evil.

14 For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you, 15 but if you do not forgive others their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.

Fasting

16 "And when you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. 17 But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, 18 that your fasting may not be seen by others but by your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

Lay Up Treasures in Heaven

19 "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, 20 but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. 21 For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

22 "The eye is the lamp of the body. So, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light, 23 but if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how great is the darkness!

24 "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.

Do Not Be Anxious

25 "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? 26 Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? 27 And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? 7 28 And why are you anxious about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, 29 yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. 30 But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? 31 Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' 32 For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. 33 But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

34 "Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble.

A Tree and Its Fruit

15 "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. 16 You will recognize them by their fruits. Week 9: Daily Repentance

The first time we hear the word "cross" in the New Testament is Matthew 10. This verse is not about the cross of Jesus, but about the cross of the Christian. Jesus says, "And whoever does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 10:38-39). Jesus repeats the same teaching a few chapters later, "Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it" (Matthew 16:24-25). This taking up our cross is a "daily" activity (Luke 9:23).

The Christian life is not a life of ease and enjoyment, but a life lived under the cross, a life of death and resurrection. St. Paul connects this to our baptism. "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4). Martin Luther explains this verse in the Small Catechism:

What does such baptizing with water indicate? It indicates that the Old Adam in us should by daily contrition and repentance be drowned and die with all sins and evil desires, and that a new man should daily emerge and arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

The Christian life is a life of **daily repentance**. Repentance has two parts: contrition and faith. Contrition is hearing clearly the Law's convicting voice. Through the Scriptures the Holy Spirit shows us our sin, our breaking of God's Law, our transgressions. Faith is believing the promises of the Gospel. Through the Scriptures the Holy Spirit comforts us with the kindness of Jesus.

The fruit (or result) of repentance is love for God and our neighbor, the good works of which our Christian life consists.

In this week's challenge is

DAILY REPENTANCE

We will focus on hearing the Law and the Gospel in the Psalms and the Scriptures, and consider how the Holy Spirit uses these two words to create in us contrition and faith. Meditation towards repentance follows this instruction: "Consider your station in life according to the Ten Commandments..." This consideration leads to repentance.

The seven Psalms we will read this week are known in the church as the "Seven Penitential Psalms." More than any other portions of the Scriptures these Psalms capture the two parts of repentance. We also begin, this week, to read the Scripture Passages out of our own Bible. The words of the Apostles' Creed are removed from the prayers. If you are still working to memorize the words of the Creed, please see a previous week's prayers.

THE EVENING PRAYER

Week 10: What do I pray for? Supplications, Prayers, Intercessions, and Thanksgiving

We will, in the next few weeks, shift our focus to our prayers, considering, first, what prayer is.

Most simply, prayer is asking God for the things needed. Intercession is prayer for others. Petition is prayer for ourselves. Thanksgiving is giving thanks for the gifts God for the things He has done. (Praise, as distinguished from Thanksgiving, is praising God for who He is. These are very close to each other.)

In the prayers for the past ten weeks we have had times for "Prayers for Ourselves and Others." It is helpful to consider what things we might include in these prayers.

Paul, in his letter to Timothy, says, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people" (1 Timothy 2:1). We say there are different types of prayers. *Supplications* are prayers for help. *Prayers* includes all of our petitions to the Lord. *Intercessions* are prayers on behalf of other people. *Thanksgivings* are prayers of thanks and praise for the things God has done for us.

This week we will begin building our prayer lists with these different categories of prayer. We will offer to the Lord our supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings.

We will use a few key questions to build our prayer lists, and each day we will add people, situations, and other things to our prayers, and include these in our petitions. After the Scripture readings we will plan our prayers, and then include the things we've written when we pray.

This week's devotional challenge is

BUILDING A PRAYER LIST

Each day will have a set of questions. The answer to these questions will be the things we pray for in the "Prayers for ourselves and others." Not knowing what to pray for is often a hindrance to our prayers. By planning our prayers ahead of time we are not troubled to think of things as we pray. Of course we are free to include all the concerns that come to our mind when we pray.

Try to pray out loud. It is better.

We also, this week, begin reading through the Psalms out of our own Bible, beginning with Psalm 1. This week we will suggest a verse to turn into a prayer. Next week you will be identifying that verse on your own. We continue reading through the Gospel of Matthew, and we will continue to include the prompting questions for the Scripture reading and Psalms for a few more weeks, but you will notice these helps gradually fading away as you become more comfortable reading, meditating on the Scriptures yourself.

Plan on 15 minutes for these readings and prayers. If this is not enough time, do what you can, focusing on this week's challenge, and not troubling yourself to finish it all. Remember, we are working on building devotional habits that will carry through to the end of our life.

THE EVENING PRAYER

Week 11: Luther's Fourfold Strand of Prayer, Part 1, Instruction

Part of our Christian devotion is learning to pray the Bible. We normally think of our prayers coming from our hearts, but prayer is something that we are taught. The Holy Spirit, through the Scriptures, teach us what to pray.

In 1535 Martin Luther wrote a wonderful little letter to his barber Peter about how he constructs his prayers from the catechism and the Scriptures. Luther talks of weaving a "four-fold strand" of prayer. Here is the important passage:

If I have had time and opportunity to go through the Lord's Prayer, I do the same with the Ten Commandments. I take one part after another and free myself as much as possible from distractions in order to pray. I divide each commandment into four parts, thereby fashioning a garland of four strands. That is, I think of each commandment as, first, **instruction**, which is really what it is intended to be, and consider what the Lord God demands of me so earnestly. Second, I turn it into a **thanksgiving**; third, a **confession**; and fourth, a **prayer**.

We will spend the next four weeks working on pulling these four things out of the Scripture texts, concentrating this week on instruction. This week's challenge, then, is

PRAYING THE INSTRUCTION OF THE TEXT

We take what we learn from the Lord and bring is back to Him in our prayers. The questions following the readings have been simplified to pull out of the readings the instruction that can be prayed. Examples are provided on the first two days. The basic prayer will be something like, "Lord, in this place you teach me that..." This is the first step towards praying the words of the Scriptures.

Also, look over the things you wrote down for last week's prayers. The last few pages of this workbook are provided as a log for your prayers. Be sure to write the date next to each prayer. You might consider finding a notebook, log, or journal to keep track of the things that you want to keep in mind for your prayers. (We will talk more about maintaining a prayer list in a future week.)

Jesus promises us that the Holy Spirit comes to convict us of our sin. "And when he comes, he will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment" (John 16:8). The Holy Spirit holds the Law before us like a mirror so that we see our sin, and confess it.

While the devil wants to keep us in the darkness, the Holy Spirit teaches us to walk in the light. The devil is always trying to distort and harden our conscience, the Holy Spirit works through the Law to tenderize our conscience. While the devil is always trying to hide our sin, the Holy Spirit teaches us to confess it.

Confession is the third of Luther's four-fold strand of prayer, and it is this week's devotional challenge:



This week is very similar to Week 9, and the challenge of daily repentance. We will be listening for the Law, and tuning in to the Holy Spirit's work of teaching us our sin from the text. We will then weave that repentance into our prayers.

We will drop the text of the Ten Commandments from the prayers, but they are more important than ever this week, so we will ask in regards to each reading what commandment(s) are being taught, and ask how this shows us our sin. If you do not have the Ten Commandments memorized, you can find the text on the back page of this workbook.

Week 14: Luther's Fourfold Strand of Prayer, Part 4, Prayer

Prayer is, at last, asking.

There are many voices telling us that it is not right or good to always being asking God for things. This is wrong. If we are not asking, we are not praying. "Ask, and you will receive" says Jesus (Matthew 7:7). Our praying of the Scriptures must end with a petition, an asking God for the things we need and the things He promises.

"Prayer" or "petition" or "asking" is the fourth and final strands of Luther's suggested wreath of prayer. We begin with instruction, continue with thanksgiving and confession, and end with asking. This week's devotional challenge, then, is

FINDING PETITIONS IN THE TEXT

If there are promises in the text, we ask the Lord to keep those promises with us. If there are warnings in the text, we ask the Lord to give us His Holy Spirit so that we would heed His instruction. We pray that the Lord would give us the wisdom taught in the text, or the patience or hope. Finally, we pray that the Lord would give us the faith to believe His Word and the love to begin to live a godly life according to it.

We add a fourth question to our text as a place to add promises and petitions, and these are to be prayed in the prayers.

Continue to add things to your prayer list, and note if there are specific prayers that have been answered. Many people find it comforting to mark when prayers are answered, and to note how the Lord takes care of all the things we want to worry about.

Next week we will drop the words of the morning and evening prayers, so focus on these if you are still learning them.

THE EVENING PRAYER

Week 15: Crafting a Collect

"Collect" is the name for a short prayer used, most often, in the services of the church. There are appointed collects for each Sunday of the Church Year, and for various different occasions. The Collect generally follows a fixed form with five parts:

- 1. The Address (to whom we are praying, normally God the Father, often God the Son, sometimes the Holy Spirit, and rarely all three Persons of the Godhead).
- 2. The Rationale (a mention of an attribute or work of God on which the petition will rest).
- 3. The Petition (the prayer itself).
- 4. The Result (our confidence that the Lord will hear and answer our prayers).
- 5. The Conclusion (which brings in the mediation of the other Two Persons of the Trinity who were not first addressed, and the Amen).

This ancient form of prayer is very helpful when we are shaping our thoughts and meditation on the Scriptures into prayers. Here are a few example collects used in the church. Here is the Collect for the Word, based on Romans 15:4:

Blessed Lord, who has caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning, grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by the patience and comfort of Thy holy Word we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life which Thou hast given us in our Savior Jesus Christ, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

The five parts are:

- 1. Address: Blessed Lord,
- 2. Rationale: who has caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning,
- 3. Petition: grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them.
- 4. Result: that by the patience and comfort of Thy holy Word we may embrace and ever hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life which Thou hast given us in our Savior Jesus Christ,
- 5. Conclusion: who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Here is another example, the Collect for Peace generally used in the Vespers service:

O God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed: Give unto Thy servants that peace, which the world cannot give; that our hearts may be set to obey Thy commandments, and also that by Thee, we, being defended from the fear of our enemies, may pass our time in rest and quietness; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

- 1. Address: O God.
- 2. Rationale: from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed:
- 3. Petition: Give unto Thy servants that peace, which the world cannot give;
- 4. Result: that our hearts may be set to obey Thy commandments,
- 5. 2nd Petition: and also that by Thee, we, being defended from the fear of our enemies,
- 6. 2nd Result: may pass our time in rest and quietness;
- 7. Conclusion: through the merits of Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

This week's devotional challenge is:

CRAFTING A COLLECT

We will take a verse from the Scripture reading or the Psalm, and build a collect with that text. The worksheet will remind you of the parts, and there will be space to put them all together.

Forming a Collect is another helpful way to turn the Scriptures into prayer, and it is particularly helpful for crafting prayers to be prayed in public.

We continue to read and meditate on a Scripture passage and a Psalm. Looking for the teaching, the surprises, delighting in the text.

NOTE

The conclusions of the collects follow a specific form.

If the prayer is addressed to God the Father, the conclusion is:

"...through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen."

If the prayer is addressed to Jesus, the conclusion is:

"...who lives and reigns with the Father and the Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen."

If the prayer is addressed to the Holy Spirit, the conclusion is:

"...for You live and reign with the Father and the Son, One God, world without end. Amen."

If any of the Person of the Holy Trinity are not originally addressed, but mentioned in the prayer, then the phrase "the same" is added before their name in the conclusion. For example, if the prayer is addressed to God the Father, but the Holy Spirit is mentioned in the body of the prayer, then the conclusion would be as follows:

"...through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the same Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen."

Please remember, though, that these rules are helping us form our prayers, and certainly should not restrict or hinder our prayers to the God who loves us and delights to hear our prayers.

THE EVENING PRAYER

Week 16: Putting It All Together

For the past 15 weeks we have been building devotional habits, learning how to give our attention to the Lord's Word and to prayer. We have, in fact, been meditating on the Second and Third Commandments.

The Second Commandment is "You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God." What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic art, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks. The Second Commandment authorizes our prayers.

So too the Third Commandment authorizes our hearing and rejoicing in the Lord's Word. "Remember the Sabbath Day by keeping it holy." What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn it. The hearing of the Lord's Word brings faith and life, joy and peace.

The practice of hearing the Lord's Word and asking for the Lord's help is a life-long process. This week's challenge is:

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER

We will consider all the putting the pieces of the devotional life into a reasonable practice that we can sustain until our death. Each day will have an outline to plan a devotion. What will you read? What will you pray? You might want to find a blank notebook to help you plan your devotions when the week is over.

For the past fifteen weeks this workbook has held your hand and led you to the Scriptures and through your prayers, and you are ready, now, to take your daily devotions and shape them yourself. You should know what worked and what didn't, what was helpful and what was difficult.

As you consider each day the shape of your prayers and meditation, remember that we are shaping a lifetime of hearing and rejoicing in the Lord's Word. What we don't read today will wait for us tomorrow. And the Holy Spirit is always helping to shape our prayers and petitions to the Lord. We remain students of His Word and of prayer until we are, at last, standing before the Lord and worship together with the saints in the resurrection.

May God grant it. Amen.

Appendix A: A Bible Reading Plan

There are hundreds of Bible Reading plans. Many are very complicated and detailed, others very simple. Some people like to read straight through he Bible. Other like to jump from the Old to the New Testament, or read from different parts of the Bible every day.

If you read three chapters of the Bible every day you would read through the entire Scriptures in one year. But some portions of the Bible are easier to read than others. The narrative portions of the Old Testament and Gospels ready very quickly. The epistles of Paul and Peter are very dense.

Pick a plan that works for you, and try it for a while. If it doesn't stick, try something different. It is a good goal to consider reading the entire Bible through cover to cover.

This is the plan that I find easiest to follow and the most helpful. It involves reading three chapters a day, six days a week. (Saturday is for catching-up or review.)

The Psalms are read through, one chapter a day.

One chapter of the Old Testament is read. I like to read through the Old Testament in rough chronological order, going back and forth between history and prophecy.

One chapter of the New Testament is read every day, rotating between the Gospels and the epistles.

My suggested ordering of the books is on the next page. It can be cut out and used as bookmarks.

Following this plan you will reading through the Old Testament in two-and-a-half years, the Psalms twice a year, and the New Testament one-and-a-half times a year.
